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A Visit to Hutton Niobrara Ranch Wildlife Sanctuary

The Hutton's donated their beautiful 5,000-acre ranch and wildlife sanctuary to AOK in 2001. It is located along the Niobrara River near Bassett, NE. It consists of spectacular scenery, including upland prairie, steep canyons, woodlands, and high bluffs that overlook meadows, marshes, and riparian forest along the river, which forms the Sanctuary's northern boundary. Two guesthouse provide opportunities for visitors to experience the diverse wildlife and gorgeous scenery.

Endangered Interior Least Tern & Threatened Piping Plover sighting at Niobrara



Gordon Warrick, Resource Management Specialist for the Niobrara National Scenic River, a part of the National Park Service, conducted his annual survey for federally listed "endangered" Interior Least Tern (*Sterna antillarum athalassos*) and state and federally listed "threatened" Piping Plover (*Charadrius melodus*). The birds prefer to nest on sandbars in large rivers that are devoid of vegetation, but high enough to survive spring flooding events. When he visited in July, he found two tern chicks and two plover chicks, although he suspected more tern chicks. He returned in August


and found five tern fledglings and three adults in attendance. He also found three plover chicks only a few days from flight stage, with one female in attendance. Fledglings are young birds that have left the nest and are capable of short flights, but are still being cared for by their parents. Photo provided by Gordon Warrick and the National Park Service.


Our Board shares their favorite walks, hikes and birding spots!



Tom Ewert recommends:

Chisholm Creek Park is located about 29th and Oliver, just off K-96 in NE Wichita. It is one of the largest parks in Wichita and has more than 2 1/2 miles of trails that wind through and around the park. The Great Plains Nature Center is located at Chisholm Creek Park.

Wichita Audubon hosts a bird walk for birders of all skill levels at Chisholm Creek Park in Wichita on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Meet in the Great Plains parking lot by 8am for a 1.5 - 2 hour walk, depending on how many birds are sighted or how hot, windy or cold it is. The route is about 1.8 miles. The trail is all on cement, pavement or boardwalk and is wheelchair accessible.

Go to www.dillons.com
